Greenbriar Children's Center By Melissa Emery

Greenbriar Children's Center was founded in 1949 as the first orphanage for black children in this community. Prior to that time, black orphans were sent to penal farms to live with criminals.

These days, Greenbriar provides the final "safety net" for children who need shelter, protection from abusive or negligent parents, and a caring environment for those to whom so little love is available.

GCC offers 5 types of service to disadvantaged, abused, and neglected children in Chatham County:

• A long-term residential program for boys and girls ages 10 to 18. This program provides long-term, supportive care for children who cannot remain in their homes or who cannot adjust to family foster care. Many of these children have been abused, neglected or abandoned.

• A residential program for older teens and young adults learning to live on their own. "Transitional Living" serves youth 16 – 21 who are without supportive families or foster care. "Supportive Living" serves homeless youth ages 17 – 21, including teen mothers who have one child under the age of 5. These are the only such programs in Southeast Georgia.

• An Emergency Shelter for children from newborns through age 17. This facility is available 24/7 and 365 days per year for children in need of immediate shelter and/or protection. Children are often dropped off at the Emergency Shelter by family members who say they cannot cope with the children, or children are placed there by the Department of Family

• Two pre-school programs, Windy's Pre-school and W.W. Law Learning Center.

• The Family Preservation Program – an in-home counseling service to help families deal with crises and family problems. Licensed social workers, several of which have masters degrees, provide counseling and referral services for families suffering from poor parenting skills.

Recent changes in the law and reductions in funding by DFACS have resulted in hard times for Greenbriar. Georgia has taken the position that group homes, such as Greenbriar, should be the destination of last resort. The state tried to place children either with relatives or in foster families rather than sending them to Greenbriar.

DFACS is the only state agency that reimburses Greenbriar for the residential programs (Emergency Shelter, Residential and transitional programs.) Due to changes in the rates being paid by DFACS, the total amount being received by GCC was reduced from \$1.8 million in 2006 to \$1.1 million in 2007.

The average amount received per child has been decreased from \$120 to \$101. This is causing GCC to run at a loss, despite significant efforts at private fundraising and effective cost-cutting to offset these reductions.

In addition to these decreases, amounts received from DFCS Homestead, DFCS Wrap Around, and DFCS Assessments programs have also been decreased. These programs provide the primary funding for pre-K programs run by GCC. Greenbriar does have the opportunity, however, to expand their services through the Family Preservation program, allowing them to provide more wrap-around services to families in the community.

Security issues for many of the children who come go Greenbriar make it impossible to use their names or photos. Face to face, however, alumni will tell you what a wonderful influence Greenbriar was in their lives. The loving, caring staff insists that these children do well in school and stay out of trouble. The girls' and boys' cottages have kitchens where the children help with meal preparation, and their sleeping rooms must be neat and tidy at all times. They learn to do everyday chores and gain life skills that their parents couldn't offer them.

Shardae Boynton is one example of a successful alumna of Greenbriar. Shardae was in residential care at Greenbriar for one year and then successfully transitioned to Greenbriar's Independent Living program. Shardae has now completed coursework at Savannah Technical College to become a certified Medical Transcriptionist and is currently enrolled at Savannah Technical College to receive her Associate's Degree in Administrative Office Technology.

Greenbriar, as the final resource for the lost and neglected children in our community, needs the help of Kiwanis, private individuals and companies in order to continue these vital services.
