As mentioned in our recent breakfast sessions, our Board members spent the majority of the time at the July Board meeting deciding which Charitable Organizations we'll support with funds and at what level. In this issue of the Kiwanigram, Erv Heitbrink summarizes those deliberations and provides the specifics on the Charities and funding levels. Note that we'll be issuing checks totaling \$71,000 to the deserving organizations over the next two months at our breakfast sessions. In all, this will make our total direct and indirect contributions for the 2005-06 program year to be in excess of \$87,000. Thanks and congratulations to all who contributed their money to and volunteered their time at our fund raising events. This is the time of year that it's great to be a Kiwanian as the fruits of our labor are shared with the needy agencies we so vigorously support. And, I'm proud to say that we've met our interim BAM Goal for this year and we're well on our way to meeting our \$1 Million donation goal by the end of 2008.

In late June I attended the Kiwanis International Convention in Montreal. There were about 6000 attendees and everyone was treated to a spectacular event. As delegates we gathered to elect new Board Trustees as well as the President for the 2009 program year and approved and defeated several proposed amendments. But the main message was "grow the membership to one million by 2015". Clubs are being asked to find ways to add to their rosters and Districts are looking to build new clubs. The idea is to look at the impact Kiwanis has as we work on changing the world one child and one community at a time now and think of what it will be when we have a million members... almost twice the impact!!! I've ordered DVDs of the opening and closing ceremonies and I'll share the highlights with you at an upcoming breakfast meeting.

In August, Erv Heitbrink, Dick Shomaker and I will be representing our Club by attending the Georgia District Kiwanis Convention being held in Marrietta. Again, we'll be electing officers and approving amendments while we learn about new state-wide initiatives coming next year. We'll keep you informed of any significant activities that will affect our Club.

Meanwhile, stay tuned, enjoy the summer and remember, it's all for the kids!!!

### **Kiwanis Efforts Benefit Young Children and Needy Families**

At its July meeting the Club board of directors decided how much and which agencies will be beneficiaries of our 2006 charitable distributions. Agency selection was based on their non profit status and proven record of serving needy children and families in the Savannah area. Award amounts were based upon our past level of support and the idea that, wherever possible, we wanted see a specific program within each agency that was either maintained or enabled as a result of our financial support. We ended up designating seventeen (17) community organizations who will be receiving checks at our regular meetings during the months of August and September.

Overall we will be distributing a total of \$70,100 and have reserved an additional \$900 for the Dollars for Doers Program. These amounts are sourced \$64,500 from our Service Account and \$6,500 from Foundation Account earnings. The resulting focus of our distribution is:

- 46% Education of Young Children
- 33% Food, Clothing & Lodging for Young Children & Needy Families
- 14% Programs for Handicapped Children
- 4% Legal Support for Abused Children
- 3% Programs for Terminally III Children

#### **Celestial Wonder**

This month and next, Earth is catching up with Mars in an encounter that will culminate in the closest approach between the two planets in recorded history. The next time Mars may come this close is, in 2287. Due to the way Jupiter's gravity tugs on Mars and perturbs its orbit, astronomers can only be certain that Mars has not come this close to Earth in the Last 5,000 years, but it may be as long as 60,000 years before it happens again. The encounter will culminate on August 27th when Mars comes to within 34,649,589 miles of Earth and will be (next to the moon) the brightest object in the night sky. It will attain a magnitude of -2.9and will appear 25.11 arc seconds wide. At a modest 75-power magnification..

Mars will be easy to spot. At the beginning of August it will rise in the east at 10p.m.and reach its azimuth at about 3 a.m. By the end of August when the two planets are closest, Mars will rise at nightfall and reach its highest point in the sky at 12:30a.m. That's pretty convenient to see something that no human being has seen in recorded history. So, mark your calendar at the beginning of August to see Mars grow progressively brighter and brighter throughout the month.
