energy for learning and growing. The kids need all the inspiration and guidance they can get, and seem eager to accept it.

Soooo, what do we get for our investment of time, money, and energy? It's not a horserace. It's a long haul, a leap of faith, and most importantly an opportunity for us Kiwanians to give back what we've learned in the hope that our successors can benefit from our experiences.

The Hesse School experience last fall semester was mixed bag -an adventure not without challenges. Bob Reinhard had a great time and kept fiddling with a pencil exercises, advertising, batch vs. assembly line production processes, and an energetic bunch of fifth graders. Chuck Ortmann was able to get his first graders to discriminate between "needs" and "wants," e.g. "Mr Chuck, I want a puppy but I NEED to go the the bathroom right NOW." Keith Glenn was unable to establish contact with his teacher designee. Bummer. Jeff Heeder taught a good second grade class. Skip Salus taught fifth graders. I had great times with an enthusiastic second grade classes, and was able to arrange a Hesse/Fengdu China elementary school connection, but my assembly line production process turned into utter chaos.

At the end of the session, I was presented with a customized classmade poster, and both Skip and Bob Reinhard received a plethora of thank you notes and cards. Skip became more or less a father figure to his 5th grade class and was an advertising guru. Tom Rood's third graders moved him greatly, although Ralph Schilly's third graders were in his words "more than a handful." Erv Hietbrink's second graders were taught by a PhD, and he did all he could to demonstrate his leadership qualities so as not to disappoint, and is still tearfully holding on to his "Thank You" cards. All in all, we provided our best efforts for over 200 kids at Hesse in the fall semester, and I think we collectively got as much or more as we gave.

This program we followed is the dreamchild of Leslie Scott Hale, Manager of Education at Jr. Achievement of Savannah. Leslie watches over all of us, Kiwanians, students, teachers, and administrators, like a den mother. She and the teachers are a joy to work with, not to mention the kids.

As a team, we have created no Astronauts or CEO's yet, but they may be lingering in the bud. At the very least, we have given some inspiration, caring, and leading by example to our youth in their tender and formative years. Anybody who hasn't forgotten what its like to be a kid can add a great deal to this program. Your participation will not just be for the students, but for yourself as well. It really does bring back youthful memories to reinvigorate you.

For enthusiasts who want to stretch their wings a bit, Jr. Achievement has many other programs and opportunities throughout Savannah. For example, this semester I'm teaching a "Success Skills" course for Jrs and Srs. At Woodville Tomkins Technical High School. Woodville is analogous to a "magnet" type school where gifted students are bussed in a couple of times a week for specialized training. At Woodville we are dealing with teambuilding and trustbuilding, business and strategic planning, marketing yourself, resume development, and interview skills. The

program is exercise driven and highly interactive. We are way outside the conventional structure and having a great experience.

We will be putting on another Hesse program this fall, and I encourage all past and prospective "Sr. Achievers" to dive right in. The water is just fine.

Chatham Scenes Chatham's Other Lighthouse

The Cockspur Light, on an islet just off the eastern end of Cockspur Island (Fort Pulaski), dates back to 1772. The current version was completed in 1837, and marked the south channel of the Savannah River.

The most famous person associated with the light was the "Waving Girl," Florence Martus, the a sister of a post-Civil War lighthouse keeper.

The Cockspur Lighthouse was decommissioned in 1909, and abandoned in 1949.

This photo was taken from a



few hundred feet north of US 80, on the eastern tip of Tybee Island. just east of Lazoretto Creek. I had to time my visit there to arrive

when the tide was fairly low, as the islet is awash much of the time, with only the light tower visible.

Article XIV, Section 1, of the Standard Form for Club Bylaws states, "This club shall seek, by fair discussions at its meetings and in other ways, to keep its members informed on all questions of public importance and any proposed legislation affecting

Why This Crazy Year?

The Kiwanis administrative year begins on October 1. Originally, clubs and districts operated on the calendar year. However, Kiwanis International officers were elected at the annual conventions in early summer and assumed office immediately or, beginning in 1950, on August 1. This led to many problems of budgeting, programming, and leadership. For example, each International President worked with two sets of district governors and club presidents, and vice versa. Finally, in 1969 the administrative year beginning October 1 was adopted for all levels of Kiwanis organization.
